Our History

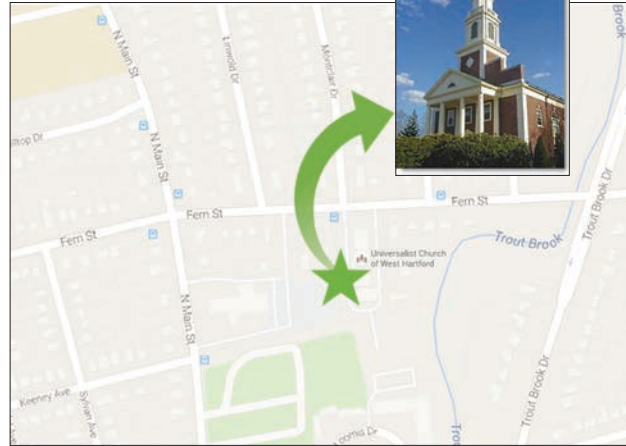
In 1821, after an inspirational visit from the noted Universalist Hosea Ballou, the "First Independent Universalist Society of the City of Hartford" was formed. Our first meetinghouse was near the Old State House in downtown Hartford.

We moved to our current location in 1931. Our main building was designed in the Colonial Revival style by Connecticut architect Walter P. Crabtree. Our magnificent Austin pipe organ was installed in 1963.

Our church has transitioned through several name changes over the years. Our current name, "The Universalist Church of West Hartford" was adopted in 1960. Since 1961, our church has been a part of the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA).

Visitors from other Unitarian Universalist churches may be surprised to see the biblical imagery in our stained glass windows. The windows are a link to our congregation's rich history, but they represent one facet of our vibrant, diverse community.

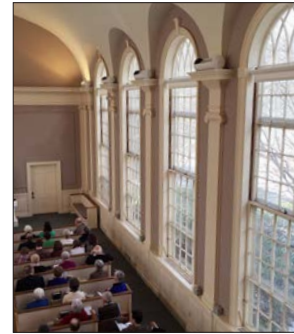
Living our Values
